# Proven Reinforcers to Create a Climate of Appreciation in Your School 

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Based on research compiled since 2004


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## What is a Reinforcer?

We wanted to research what would motivate students and staff to have desired behaviors. We brainstormed and decided the best way to discover this was by asking the subjects themselves. We have been working on this since 2004. This book is filled with ideas that came directly from students and staff around the world.

Our first research was just a list. This year we decided to categorize that list into categories. This book is the result of much pondering and discussion regarding categories. We also wanted a mnemonic that would help staff remember the categories. We know there are more than five categories; which makes it harder to remember. We felt the eight categories were necessary.

## Five Languages of Appreciation in the Workplace

Based on the work of Chapman and White (2012), we have taken the ideas from their book The Five Languages of Appreciation in the Workplace and applied those ideas to what we discovered from interviewing students.

Chapman and White (2012) found these five areas were desired by adults:

1. Words of Affirmation
2. Quality Time
3. Acts of Service
4. Tangible Gifts
5. Physical Touch

This book is available on www.amazon.com and could easily be used by principals and superintendents to develop ideas for adult reinforcements. Chapman and White (2012) interviewed people who worked in industries where there was money for vacations in Hawaii and monetary incentives. This is not the case in the field of education, but it will give you many ideas for adult reinforcers.
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## What would you like to receive as a reinforcer?

## Student Reinforcers

We found what PALPATES a student's heart with reinforcements was the following:

1. Privileges
2. Attention
3. Leadership
4. Praise
5. Assistance
6. Touch
7. Escape
8. Supplies

This information was gathered by asking students at whatever schools we were visiting the following question, "What would mean the world to you? What could an adult give you that would let you know you had done a good job on something; but, it can't cost any money?" In twelve years of asking this question, only one student has broken the code by naming something tangible. It was a little girl ( $5^{\text {th }}$ grader) in Wyoming who said, "Food would be nice." Upon further questioning of staff, we discovered the staff were working to get her removed from her home because her mother was selling the weekend food backpack for drugs. It was not happening as fast as everyone would have liked.

We added the supplies despite the lack of support from students naming this as a choice. We feel there are some students who come from homes where they cannot afford the proper school supplies and these should be made available as a purchase. The student will feel better if they earned the supplies rather than receiving a hand-out.
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Some of the answers students gave us really stuck with us. Here are a few examples:

A young man in an alternative placement said, "Do you really care?" When assured we did, he said, "I used to be on drugs. I wasn't very nice when I was on drugs. Everyone in this place knew me. It's been hard, but l've been clean for 3 months, 4 days, and 12 hours. I wish just once someone would tell me they are proud of me for staying clean. That would mean the world to me. Even if they said, "I like you better when you aren't on drugs." That would be okay too."

Another young man on a NYC District 75 school bus told us this after being labeled by the matron of the bus as the number one worst kid on the bus. "Man, I see people throw a football. When they throw the football it goes straight. When I throw a football it goes all wonky. If someone could teach me how to throw a football so that it would go straight, that would mean the world to me.

The second worst student on the bus (according to the matron) said, "I stink (okay, similar word with same beginning and ending consonants) at spelling. If somebody could help me understand that 'e' before 'i' except after 'c' rule...or whatever that is, that would really help me out."

All students do not want the same thing, just as all adults do not want the same thing. It is important to offer choices.

As you build your menu of reinforcement for your PBIS program, make sure you have several choices in each of the previous arenas and that they are different prices.

One of our schools developed a folder that looked like a restaurant menu. The sample on the previous page is for the appetizers. There were appetizers, main courses, and desserts. The students could pick from each and cash in their gotchas. The students would then receive a preprinted certificate for the reinforcement they selected.
"Gotchas" is the generic word we use to talk about your positive behavior specific praise that you give to students when you are teaching expectations through labeling appropriate behavior. Each gotcha is typically worth one point.

## Privileges

Privileges are items earned that are not ordinary. A few of these will be repeated in attention because they are quality time and attention as well as special privileges. Dictionary definition: "a special right, advantage, or immunity granted or available only to a particular person or group of people."

## Praise

Praise is sometimes desired by students. Other times, when praise is given the student immediately has an inappropriate behavior. If you are interested in the "why" behind that phenomenon, read my Four P's for raising self-esteem PowerPoint. Some students like their praise in public and some like private. Dictionary Definition: the expression of approval or admiration for someone or something. One of the most important caveats I can impart is this: It must be behavior specific praise. The words "good job" mean nothing. It has to be paired with a labeling of the appropriate behavior.

# 100 Free or Inexpensive Reinforcements for Parents to Offer Their Children 

## Free or Inexpensive Reinforcements for Parents

## Young Children

1. Ask your children if they'd rather have a dollar a day for thirty days or a penny a day that doubles each day for 30 days. In other words, on day one 1 cent, day two 2 more cents, day three 4 cents and so on. Once they decide then help them figure out which one would have been the better deal. $\$ 10,737,418.23$ at the end of 30 days with the double the pennies per day. This is just a hypothetical situation; they don't really get the money ;) But it's a fun interaction.
2. Assist the parent with a household chore
3. Attach cork panels to a wall in the kitchen or put in a large picture frame and put a special piece of art, poetry, or an exceptional paper on the board and have the entire family view and comment at dinner on the highlighted piece.
4. Bury treasures in a sandbox for the child to find. Put letters in plastic Easter eggs and they have to put the letters together that spell treat the child will receive. (Ideas: a walk with grandma, bike riding at the park, etc.)
5. Buy your child an inexpensive digital camera and have them take pictures and then gather the family with popcorn and watch the video on your television by hooking the camera to the television or upload to the computer and attach the computer to the television. Have everyone choose a favorite photo and talk about it. Let them use your phone and take pictures that you turn into a PowerPoint presentation instead of watching television.
6. Camp out in the backyard with a parent.
7. Change the screen saver on your computer to say "My child is the greatest." ...or something that would make them feel good about themselves. Do this at your office and then take a picture of it or take your child to your office on the weekend and let them see it.
8. Check with your local humane society and see if they allow children under 18 to volunteer to feed and water the animals. (Some shelters only allow adults over 18). Let your child earn the privilege of going to the shelter to feed and water the animals. Perhaps they can walk a small dog or pet a cat. IF they don't allow children to volunteer, the child can earn some money and donate dog or cat food to the shelter.
9. Dig shapes in the sandbox and then decorate with items found around the house. Pour inexpensive plaster of Paris into the shape and wait to dry. When it's pulled out it will be a sandy relief that can be hung on the wall (if you remember to put a paper clip in the plaster of Paris on the top before it dries () )
10. Download a fun recipe and let your child help you make that recipe as a surprise for the rest of the family that evening. (Put up signs that say "Secret Cooking in Progress". Must have special pass to enter the kitchen.
11. Find an old croquet set- probably on Ebay. Set up croquet in your yard and challenge your child to a game of croquet. The winning child gets to choose what the family eats for dinner.
12. Find an old fashioned popcorn popper (not an air popper). Spread an old sheet out on the living room floor, put a little oil in the popper and then have your children sit outside the perimeter of the sheet. Put a few kernels of popcorn in the popper and watch them fly up in the air. The kids will love watching this. For a special treat pour cinnamon sugar on the popcorn after it pops.
13. Find some light balsa wood and create a boat powered by a rubber band and paper clip paddle wheel. Make a unique sail and take the boat to a creek or lake nearby and help your child launch their boat. Be sure to take a butterfly net to retrieve the boat when it goes
downstream. (Proactively, you could put an eye hook on the front of the boat and attach some fishing line to it so it can be brought back to shore.
14. Get a car ride to or from school instead of the bus
15. Get to ask friends to bring dog and cat food to their birthday party instead of toys that will break. Take the food to a shelter the day after as a reinforcement. They will get a ton of attention from the staff.
16. Get to be the first person to share 3 stars and a wish at the dinner table (3 good things that happened that day and one thing they wish had gone better.)
17. Get to choose the game the family plays together that night
18. Get to choose the story the family reads out loud together (read the classics)
19. Get to choose what is fixed for dinner that night- example: "You get to choose: I can make tacos or meatloaf. Which do you want me to fix?"
20. Get to create a family night activity- roller skating, hiking in the park, picnic dinner on the living room floor or under the dining room table with blankets over the top.
21. Get to decorate paper placemats for the dining room table for dinner that evening
22. Get to gather old toys and take to a shelter for children who have nothing
23. Get to go shopping with a parent as an only child. Give them a special task to look for something that you are seeking. For example: "Here's a picture of a blue blouse that I'm trying to find. Help me look for something that looks like this."
24. Get to go with a parent to volunteer at a retirement home (the children will get tons of attention)
25. Get to have a picture framed for mom or dad's office
26. Get to help parent fix dinner- shell peas, peel potatoes, make art out of vegetables, make ants on a log etc.
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27. Give your child a nice piece of Manila paper and some wax crayons. Have them color a design on every inch of the paper- could be stripes or wavy lines- whatever they desire. Then have them cover the entire page with black crayon. They color over the entire page. Then give them a paper clip and have them open one end and scratch a cool design into the black crayon. The colors underneath will show through. Do an art gallery tour and have tea and cookies after looking at the different pictures.
28. Give your child a special piece of jewelry that belongs to you to keep and wear for the day. (Nothing that costs a lot of money- but something that looks like it is special to you.) The child will feel special all day long.
29. Go outside and collect cool leaves and flowers. Come inside and put those leaves and flowers between two sheets of wax paper. The parent will iron these two sheets together and create placemats for everyone in the family for the evening.
30. Go to your local appliance store and ask them to save a refrigerator box for you. The next time your child earns a reinforcement, give them the box and help them plan and decorate the box to turn it into anything their imagination desires.
31. Have a date night with your child as an only child. Take your child out to dinner and a play or a movie.
32. Have a talent night for the family. Have everyone keep it a secret what they are doing and then perform for each other.
33. Have the bedroom fairy come while they are at school and choose the bedroom that is the neatest. Hang a fairy from the doorway of the room that is the neatest and that person gets to sit in "Dad's chair" to read that night. (Or something that would be appropriate at your house).
34. Have your child collect some toys they have outgrown. Clean up the toys and take them to a local hospital children's ward and donate the toys to the ward. The child will get lots of attention and feel good.
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35. Help your child organize their room giving them a mnemonic to help them remember where things go- for instance teach them the color order of the rainbow and then teach them to hang up their clothes in color groups matching the order of the rainbow (ROYGBIV). Later on when you catch them hanging up their clothes in the correct place draw a "rainbow" award for their good work and put it on their door as a surprise when they come home.
36. Let your child design thank you cards, birthday cards, or holiday cards and use them to send to friends and relatives. Make sure they sign their work.
37. Let your child dictate where you drive on the way home from a location. In other words, they have to tell you turn left here...turn right here. If they happen to steer you into a Baskin Robbins Ice Cream Parlor, it wouldn't be a horrible thing to stop and have a family treat together.
38. Let your child earn 5 minutes of either staying up later or sleeping in in the morning. Use that time to read together if they stay up later.
39. Let your child help you do the laundry and then pay them with a special dessert for dinner. Be sure to say, "Since you helped me save time by helping me fold the laundry, I have time to make this special dessert for dinner."
40. Let your child take the digital camera out in the back yard and then come back in and turn those pictures into a story on the computer. Help them print off their book for a distant family member.
41. Make a story on the computer with your child using Microsoft's PowerPoint program. Let your child be the star of the story.
42. Make Papier-mâché Halloween masks by taking punch ball balloons and spreading the paper strips over the balloon shape. Make noses, horns, tongues whatever they desire and then paint when dry. You will have a unique and free Halloween costume and you will have given your child tons of attention.
43. Make special mud pies in the backyard with mom or dad or have a family contest to see who can make the best mud pie.
44. Mystery grab bag. Take an old pillow case and put slips of paper inside listing some of the reinforcers on this page and let the child draw out the reinforcer they are going to get for their behavior reinforcer.
45. Play hide and go seek in your house in the dark. Turn out all the lights and have everyone hide. One person is "it" and they have to go around the house and find the people who are hiding. It's really a great way to help your children not be afraid of the dark. You can limit it to one or two rooms if your children are young.
46. Play secretary and let your child dictate a story to you. Type up the story and send it out to some relatives who will call them and tell them how much they liked the story.
47. Play the "Gatekeeper Game" with your child. You make up cards of animals (pictures or words)- hold out your arms like a gatekeeper. As the child approaches with a card, tell them the animal can pass or not pass. If they can pass, the child lays the card down behind you. Otherwise, the card is discarded. At the end of all the cards, the child has to decide why some animals got through and others didn't. (Could be farm animals, animals with four legs, animals that can fly, animals that lay eggs- lots of possibilities)
48. Send an email to a relative telling them what a good job they had done on a project at school. In other words, email Aunt Linda and tell her about the " $A$ " you got on your spelling test.
49. Sign your child up for acting lessons (they have to have earned this privilege). Many universities offer free acting classes on the weekend for children.
50. Start a family story at the dinner table and each person in the family has to tell a part of the story. The child being reinforced gets to start and end the story.
51. Surprise your child with a scavenger hunt around the house. If they read, give them written clues hinting as to where the next card is hiding. At the end have them find a note that tells them their big reinforcer. (If your child can't read, you can use pictures.)
52. Take a tension curtain rod and put it in the door frame with some old curtains attached. Let your child put on a talent show for you as they enter through the curtain.
53. Take all the kids to grandma and grandpa's house except one and let that child stay home with mom and dad and be "only child" for the weekend. The other kids will get spoiled with lots of attention by grandma and grandpa and the "only child" will get lots of attention from mom and dad. (If you don't have grandma and grandpa nearby- trade with another family taking turns to keep each other's children.)
54. Take your child fishing. It's a great place to have some really in depth conversations.
55. Take your child for a ride looking for items that start with each letter of the alphabet. Take the child's picture in front of each item that starts with that letter and then put it together as an ABC Book. For example: "This is Johnny in front of Applebees." "This is Johnny in front of BlockBuster." And so on....
56. Take your child on a nature walk and collect rocks. Bring the rocks back home and have a contest painting the rocks to look like animals.
57. Take your child to an art gallery and then have them draw a picture of their favorite painting or statue. Possibly stage a mini art gallery tour of the child's work for relatives who are coming to visit. Serve cheese and grape juice.
58. Take your child to the local fire department. As long as they are not busy, they will be glad to show the child around and give them some great attention. Most children have seen a fire truck, but few have actually gone to the fire department to see what it looks like.
59. Take your child to the university astronomy lab. (It is usually free). Help them place stars on the ceiling of their room in their favorite constellation. If possible they could paint the stars with "glow in the dark" paint.
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60. Take your children to the library one at a time and give them special one on one time at the library checking out books or listening to stories.
61. Teach your child how to darn a sock and then turn it into a magical sock puppet. Put on puppet shows for each other.
62. Teach your child how to throw a football, shoot a basket, kick a field goal, hit a baseball, and putt a golf ball. Then for fun, switch hands and try to do all of those things with the opposite side of the body.
63. Tell your children you have a surprise performance for them. Get a stocking cap and lay on a sturdy table with your head hanging chin up in the air. Cover all of your face with the stocking cap except your chin and mouth. Draw two eyeballs on your chin and then lip sync to a silly song. It looks really funny, like a little headed person with a big mouth singing. Then let your child put on a performance for you.
64. Turn your dining room table into a cave by covering it with blankets, quilts and sheets that cover the top and sides down to the floor. Lay inside the cave and draw picture by flashlight to hang on the wall of the cave- just like the caveman drawings. You can safety pin the pictures to the "cave walls".
65. Write a story for your child where the child or their personal hero is a character in the story.

## Teenagers

1. A gallon of paint is inexpensive. Let the child choose the color and help them paint their room. You can also buy mistake paint (colors that didn't work out for others) and let the child paint a mural on their bedroom wall.
2. Choose a family member of the month and make a poster of them. Let them choose Friday night dinners for the month.
3. Do some research for your teenager. For example, if your teen is studying Greek Mythology go to the library and check out all the books on Greek Mythology for them or download some appropriate
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materials from the Internet (be careful of the Internet as some information is not correct).
4. Do your own Trading Spaces. Parents redecorate the teen's bedroom and the teen redecorates the parent's bedroom.
5. Have a contest to see who can find something that no one in the family can guess what it is. For example, a shirt stay, or the inside spring to a toy, things that might not be recognizable away from their use.
6. Have everyone come to the table with a quote and then a contest to see who can guess who made the quote famous.
7. Help your teen become a big brother or sister to a child who needs a mentor. There is no greater gift you can give yourself than that of service to someone in need.
8. Help your teenager organize their notebook using color coded folders for each subject and pocket folders for study cards.
9. Help your teenager study for a test by downloading a free Who Wants to be a Millionaire PowerPoint game and put the answers to your teenagers' test into the game and then play to help them study.
10. Hide positive messages all over your teenager's room, in their books they use at home (you don't want them to get embarrassed at school), on their bathroom mirror, etc.
11. Hire your child to be an interior decorator and using only items available in the house, redo a room in the house.
12. Let them drive the "good" car for a special occasion.
13. Let your teen host the training of a guide dog. This will teach them responsibility and give them a sense of pride.
14. Let your teenager play their music during dinner and talk to you about why they like each song that plays.
15. Make a deal. If your child maintains the grades you agree upon, does not have any unnecessary absences, and has been agreeable, allow them to take a mental health day and stay home on a day you are home as well. Go window shopping together, fishing, go-kart riding, or whatever would float your child's boat. My mother did this
with us when we were children and I still remember these days fondly.
16. Make a scrap book of your teenager and their friends with ticket stubs and pictures and present at a surprise party.
17. Make a special mix CD for your teen of their favorite songs. You can upload I-tunes and then copy their own CD's into the program and mix and match their favorite songs onto one CD so they don't have to flip through CD's to listen to their favorite songs.
18. Make flash cards for your student's exams to help them study for a big exam.
19. One of the greatest gifts you can give to a teenager is to teach them charity. Sign up to work in a soup kitchen, nursing home, or other similar area and work with them once a month.
20. Organize a neighborhood football or basketball game "oldies" vs. "youngsters" or "men" vs. "Women" and then have a block barbecue afterwards.
21. Save your change for a year. Let your teenager choose what to do with that money. One family that I know saved enough to take a family of six to Disneyland.
22. Scan your teenager's papers or art work and have them bound in a book (www.lulu.com has inexpensive binding available). Present the book to your teenager at a special dinner.
23. Surprise them with their favorite dessert for no special reason.
24. Surprise your teen with a scavenger hunt all over the house when they get home from school. Make the clues hard to figure out. I always had a little reinforcer at the end like baseball cards.
25. Take your teen to a museum, on a nature walk, to a sporting event, whatever would float their boat. It's the time you spend with them that is important and there are many free events you can attend.
26. Tape record your student's study questions onto a tape recorder for them so they can listen to them while they are going to sleep.
27. Teach your children how to play a game like Spoons, Canasta, Poker, etc. And have a family game night.
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28. Teenagers have a difficult time with their emotions. Download yoga lessons from online and do yoga breathing exercises together as a family. Talk to your child about using these techniques when they feel tense at school.
29. Teenagers need extra-curricular activities; however, these activities are expensive. Work out a deal with the karate teacher, horse stable, art teacher, sport coach etc. Offer to provide transportation, house cleaning duties once a month, or precooked meals to get a discount on these classes for your teenager.
30. Turn out all the lights in the house and play hide and go seek in the dark. The person that can stay hidden the longest gets to choose the movie the family watches on Saturday night. Our personal children loved this well into their teens because they got better at hiding.
31. Use plastic Easter eggs and put dollar amounts in the eggs on slips of paper and number the eggs with a permanent marker. Play Deal or No Deal with one of the parents playing the banker.
32. Watch an old black and white classic movie together and talk about how movies have changed. My children loved "Harvey" with Jimmy Stewart when they were teenagers.
33. Watch Jeopardy and give each family member a pad of post it notes or index cards. Have everyone write down what they think the answer is and keep points. The person who wins gets to pick what the family does as an activity that weekend.
34. Write a story about the 20 things you love about them. Include fun pictures.
35. Write half a story or poem and let your teenager write the other half. Submit the story for publication.

## Reinforcements for Adults in Your Building

One of the items discussed in monthly brainstorming sessions at our schools was the difficulty for those who see every single student in the school to be part of delivering gotchas. Especially, the elementary school special teachers (music, PE, computer lab, library, Spanish class, art class, dance class)

These are some of the trophies we brainstormed and use in the schools. The class with the best manners during the week get to earn this trophy and bragging rights. Their name is called on the announcements and posted in the front hallway on a poster.

## Physical Education

- Donated tennis shoes from local basketball heroes (For instance, the shoes are size 18)
- Football helmet from local football team
- Hockey mask from local hockey team
- Home plate signed by local baseball team
- Old team trophy that has the nameplate removed and a plaque that says "Class of the Week"
- Old tennis shoes spray painted gold or silver
- Soccer ball attached to a base so it looks like a trophy


## Music Education

- A plastic child's guitar as a trophy
- Decorated tambourine as a trophy
- Old guitar hero as a trophy
- Old LP spray painted gold or silver and put in record album frame
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## Librarian

- A discarded children's book turned into a clock as a trophy
- Shelf elf as a class trophy
- Stuffed animal character from a favorite children's book as a class trophy


## Spanish Teacher

- Maracas as a class trophy
- Sarape as a class trophy
- Sombrero as a class trophy


## Art Teacher

- Beret as a class trophy
- Paint brushes spray painted gold or silver and connected together as a trophy
- Paint palette as a trophy


## Computer Teacher

- Clock made out of motherboards as a class trophy
- Mouse spray painted gold or silver as a class trophy
- Old computer monitor with the components on the inside removed as a class trophy


## Dance Teacher

- Ballet or Tap shoes spray painted gold or silver as a class trophy
- Ribbon hoop as a class trophy


## Custodian

## Classrooms

Custodians like to get in on the action too. This works for elementary and secondary schools. The custodian walks around at the end of the day and looks for the classroom that is left the cleanest. They attach a golden or silver plunger to the white board of the classroom. Here is what happens the next day:

- Elementary: The line leader gets to carry it wherever they go. All other classes must stop and salute.
- Secondary: The class that was in the classroom last earns a reward dictated by the teacher (Homework free night, drop everything and draw etc.)

This has been awesome.

## Bathrooms

Some custodians do dust-pans that are spray painted gold or silver with a little stuffed bunny attached. They call this the dust bunny award and award it to the bathroom that is left the cleanest. At the elementary level that hallway earns 5 extra minutes of recess.

## Hallways

Especially at the secondary level, the hallways can be left a mess between class changing periods. Awards can be given to hallways and those in that hallway can earn some kind of special reinforcement. ${ }^{\mathrm{Tm} \otimes}$ © Permission to copy and share with this in the footer.

## Whole School Ideas

## Office Discipline Referrals

## Elementary

Zero the Hero- Principal dresses up as Zero the Hero the day after a zero office discipline referrals. The principal is in this costume during lunch or all day greeting students and eating lunch with them.

## Secondary

Zero Office Discipline Referrals earns the principal a Zorro costume. The principal runs through the school into every classroom putting a " $Z$ " on the board for a zero homework day. The day is at the teacher's discretion.

## Long term goals

For 10 zero office discipline referral days, the principal will spend 24 hours on the roof of the school dressed as Zorro or Zero the Hero For 20 zero office discipline referral days, the whole staff will come to school dressed as heroes.

For 30 zero office discipline referral days, the whole school will perform a lip sync choreographed song of the students' choosing in a videoshown during homeroom time.

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## Cafeteria

## Noise Level, Neatness, Etc.

One of the topics discussed in monthly brainstorming sessions was the noise level in the cafeteria as well as the neatness and overall behavior. We brainstormed this idea and it has been a hit:

Tables are assigned- students can sit anywhere at the table, but they stay with the same table. The tables are labeled with a color or number. Each day of the week, the cafeteria staff carry spray painted ice cream sticks. They add ice cream sticks to library pockets that coordinate with the table numbers or letters. So if you have three lunch periods- you would have Table A1, B1, C1. Each day the ice cream stick colors change colors. On Tuesday, the table that earned the most ice cream sticks for appropriate behavior gets to sit at a special table. They could also earn first dibs in line that day. Some schools let them bring in their technology and listen to music on earphones. On Wednesday, whoever earned the most on Tuesday gets the table rights. This goes on through the week. Monday is based on Friday. The big pay-off is on Thursday, the group that earned the most ice cream sticks (all colors) gets to choose what four teachers and what song. Those teachers must perform by lip-syncing to that song for that lunch period. It is a small group contingency with a big group pay-off. Elementary schools sometimes perform on Friday morning at Friday Round-up for the whole school. It is up to the school and staff.

This has improved behavior in the lunchroom tremendously.

## Music

Many of our schools have started playing classical music during lunch from the baroque period. Most of this music is 60 bpm which has a calming effect. It is played at conversation level.
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## Hallway

## Hallway Noise-Group Contingency-Group Reinforcement

The staff sets up a decibel reader. These can be downloaded as an app for your phone or iPad. Once you know your baseline level, set up a $50 \%$ reduction. Tell the students if they meet the goal for one week, the principal will spend the day dressed up in costume (tutu, cow costume, cheerleader, favorite book character etc.)

## Hallway-Different Context Confusion

One middle school we worked with had students being very noisy coming back from lunch in the middle of the day. After discussion, we decided the confusion was the ability to talk and visit with friends in the morning and during class changing periods. When coming back from lunch, class is going on and they need to be using zero inch voices. It was hard for the students to code switch without an environmental cue. The electricians came out and rewired the lights so the lights could be turned down during lunch period. The environmental cue was dimmed lights. The students were taught, imprinted, practiced, and praised for recognizing the dimmed lights as a cue to be using zero inch voices. Reinforcements were offered during assemblies for reaching the goal of zero inch voices during lunch passing time.

## Tardies

At the secondary level, tardies can be an issue between class changing periods. One school brainstormed a solution that has been working for seven years. The principal took data on baseline tardies. The school was averaging 50 tardies per hour (Large school 6-12 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ grade). They had a five-minute class changing period because the school was literally one-mile-long and a few students needed all five minutes. He took a survey of favorite music. He gave them one week free. He would play four
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minutes of their music during class changing time and one minute of his music. His music was polka music (It had to sound different enough for the students to take notice.) He gave them a target and told them as long as they met that target, he would continue to play their music in the four-minute interval. If the target rose above his level, he would play four minutes of polka music and one minute of their music. He has only had to do that once. The students monitor themselves.

While we do not recommend food rewards or tangibles for students, we find it quite reinforcing for adults.

Notes for your ideas:
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## Random Reinforcements for Staff

These can be drawn from gotchas that are turned in or offered to everyone.

- Adult gets to pick what the topic for a faculty meeting is going to be
- Adult gets to rent the principal's chair for the day
- Ask an office supply store to consider donating their clearance items to the school and have a "store" for all the staff members to come in and "purchase" office supplies with gotchas they received from each other.
- Ask everyone to start a diary writing down 3 things that went well each day. Ask the staff to bring their diaries to faculty meetings. Reinforce staff for bringing the diaries and give out chocolate kisses to everyone who shares at least one thing from their diary.
- Ask parents to send in praise via email. At the end of the day, do a David Letterman's mail bag and read the kudos that came in via email about staff members. Give kudos to the parent who shared by sending a hand written note. It won't take long for word to spread that compliments are appreciated.
- Ask PTO to do a pot luck- put a ladle in the teacher's boxes and message like this- "You've been dishing the learning. Since we have to stay late tonight for the meetings, we'd like to dish some treats your way. Meet us in the lounge for a delicious treat.
- Ask the cafeteria staff to bake some special cookies. After a particularly difficult day, invite all the staff to come down for cookies in the cafeteria. Have the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team set up ready to entertain. The UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team might be dressed as Alvin and the Chipmunks and lip sync
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the Alvin and the Chipmunks song. Another idea is to have the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team put on lipstick and paint eyeballs and a nose on their chins. Then lay across a table with heads hanging backwards with stocking caps over their hair, face, and nose. Then lip sync to a silly song like "We are Family."
- Ask your employees what makes them tick. Ask each employee to list their values that guide their daily decisions. During conferences with individuals ask them to compare and contrast their values with the mission of the school.
- At Family Math Night all the adults are highlighted in a video montage
- At the beginning of the year, have staff fill out a questionnaire on spouse and children's birthdays. Send birthday cards from the school to spouses and children. Recognizing that staff members have lives outside the school is very important.
- Blank diary with a name on each page (every staff member). This rotates through the school as people write positive things about each person. When it shows up in your box, you have 24 hours to read it and write something about others and then put it in another box.
- Bouncy Castle Moon Walk Bounce for the Adults- You've got to act like a kid again
- Bring in a masseuse and a massage chair and provide free massages during planning periods. Darken the staff lounge, play classical music and burn candles (if the fire marshal approves). Do this during one of the more difficult months for student behavior. (October, December, March, April, May).
- Bulletin board highlighting staff of the day showing treasures provided by their family (surprise) If you have about 90 staff members one every other day would work
- Call each other by name especially in front of the students. "Good morning, Mrs. Turquoise." And Mrs. Turquoise says, "Good morning, Mr. Purple". Modeling appropriate greetings is very important for the students and using names with each other shows respect for individuals.
- Call in an ice cream truck to come to the school the last day of criterion reference testing. Have the truck show up after all the students are gone and invite all the staff to come down and have an ice cream on the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team. Tell them they are "Way Cool, the way they accomplished all the testing this week."
- Create an instruction manual based on skills developed or used by team members in the school. Beginning of the year tips from the experts. Take a picture of each staff member with their words of wisdom and print the book off for all staff. Give a copy to new staff members and substitute teachers. For example, "Mr. Green's recipe for cheering up students on a difficult day. Do a magic trick. Have two brown paper bags. Put a piece of fruit in one brown paper bag and staple it shut. Ask the students to guess what fruit is in the bag. Have little slips of paper and pretend to write the fruits that the students name on pieces of paper and drop them in the other brown paper bag. Now tell the students that you will be able to pull out the exact name of the fruit in the sealed bag. Reach in to the open paper bag and pull out a slip of paper and amazingly read the name of the fruit that is in the bag. Show the students that it indeed says "apple" (or whatever fruit). Then open the sealed brown paper bag and show the apple. The students will be amazed. What the students do
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not know is that you wrote "apple" on every piece of paper that you put in the open brown paper bag. Even though you pretended to struggle even to write the word rhubarb- you were really writing apple. It's a great mood breaker. "Put a picture of Mr. Green on this page. On the next page you might have Mrs. Brown's great math experiment. "Mrs. Brown asks her students to answer this question: Which would you rather have? A dollar a day for the next 30 days or a penny on day one, two pennies on day two, four pennies on day three, eight pennies on day four and so on for 30 days? The students guess and then Mrs. Brown shows them that pennies doubled each day for thirty days comes out to $10,737,418.23$ dollars. It is great fun to watch their faces." Put Mrs. Brown's picture on this page.
- Dim the lights in the staff lounge and get a volunteer masseuse to come provide 5 -minute neck rubs during planning periods- Play restful music
- Do a staff survey and find out everyone's favorite snack? Stock the staff lounge with snacks one day a week. The PTO could help furnish the snacks.
- Dollar Store Humming Bird Feeder- "You make this school hum because...."
- Dollar Store Kneeling Pad- "Thank you for planting the seeds of knowledge"
- Dollar Store- Oriental Trading Company- Cardboard coastersmake great clipboards for writing gotchas in the hallways- easy to have with you- coaster and a binder and you have an instant clipboard.
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- Donut day- These donuts are in honor of Peggy's contribution to the PTO (PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION) (PARENT TEACHER ORGANIZATION)
- Draw a staff member's name, and watch them all day and then report on what great deeds they did over the intercom that afternoon for all to hear. (Report good news)
- During morning announcements highlight something that an adult in the building did and tell why
- Duty free lunch period
- Each day have the entire UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team spend ten minutes looking for someone doing something that furthers the goals of the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR plan of action. Give out special gotchas good for leaving school 10 minutes early on a day of choice.
- Encourage employees to post their values in a conspicuous place in their respective rooms.
- Find a beauty school and get someone to volunteer to come in and do 5 minute manicures
- Flowers on the desk from someone's garden (with permission)
- Get a donation of a shopping cart to keep at the school for adults bringing in huge loads of supplies
- Get a parent volunteer to be at the door in the morning dressed in a tuxedo. Have them speak in a British accent and greet each staff member as they enter the building. They could say something like, "We've been anticipating your arrival Mrs. Yellow."
- Give each other affirmations. When someone says, "Oh my goodness, I don't think I can handle another day of Johnny and Susie swinging from the chandelier." Make sure the staff is ready
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to tell each other "You can do it." "I know you can do it." "I have faith in you."
- Give out thank you cards to all staff members and ask them to write one a week to someone on the staff. Ask them to write to different people each week.
- Give out the Depends Award during staff meeting. Take a pair of Depends ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ Undergarments and spray paint them gold. Give out the Depends Award to the most dependable person each week. This is an award they can keep until It is passed on to the next person. Be specific about how each person is dependable.
- Go around a local mall and ask the store owners to donate items to celebrate great education staff members. If the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team splits up the mall, they can collect a huge bevy of items for giveaway items for the adults. Use these as reinforcers for recognizing everyone's contributions to the greater cause.
- Golden plunger award from custodian for classroom that was the cleanest
- Golden spatula award from cafeteria staff for most polite class of the week
- GOOSE- Get Out Of School Early- No staying for the 30 after
- Gotchas work for school personnel, but only if everyone remembers. Put three silver dollars in your left pocket in the morning. As you compliment different adults in the building, move a silver dollar from your left pocket to your right pocket. At the end of the day, all three silver dollars should be in your right pocket. (You move from left to right to help you remember you are doing the "right" thing.)
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- Have the entire staff fill out a sheet answering this question: 1) Name something about yourself that no one else would ever guess. Each morning read one clue and give everyone an answer sheet. Each day they are to guess who the mystery person is based on the clues read that morning. After all the clues have been read, invite the whole staff to a pizza party. Read the entire list of clues and have people guess aloud and then have the real mystery person confess their secret identity. Have a reinforcer for the person who gets the most guesses correct.
- Have the principal make up a rap song about being cool in school and perform it on the CCTV for the school- Staff of the Day get to be background dancers
- Have the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team read books that would be helpful for teachers and create "Cliff's Notes" on those books for the staff. Send it out in a weekly newsletter. Book idea: Marzano's "What Works in Schools."
- Have your UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team go online and post positive statements about each one of the staff members on the school website. Example: Meet John Jones. Loves waterskiing and horseback riding. We love the way Mr . Jones is always at the front door to greet the students.
- Highlight staff strengths in the parent newsletter. Let the parents know the strengths of each staff member throughout the year.
- Hire a celebrity impersonator to come to the school and visit classrooms. For example: Abraham Lincoln visits the school and comes in each classroom giving a small history lesson tying something special about the adults in each room to the history lesson. For example, "I was the only president to ever own a
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patent. I designed a special idea that helped boats float over sand bars. I was good at floating boats and Mrs. Blue has designed a special chair that lets students get their wiggles out."
- Hire the high school choir to change the words to a popular song and serenade the staff with a kudos song some morning.
- Identify what each staff member does best and have an "Academy Awards" ceremony with statues for each person. Invite the parents to come to the award ceremony.
- If a staff member has a problem, find out about it and figure out a way to help them. For example, if a staff member's child is struggling in Algebra find another staff member who is willing to tutor that member's child in exchange for something they needlike their car washed.
- Instead of criticizing an employee who has behaviors you would like to "target" for change, make a positive intervention. Express to the employee what needs to change and end with a statement affirming, "I have confidence in you that you can get this done."
- Invite spouses and children to come up for the catered dinner on the nights your staff need to work late.
- Invite staff members to the next board meeting and stand up and compliment their achievement to the board.
- Limo ride to school and home for staff of the day- This sounds weird but funeral parlors will sometimes provide this service for free if they aren't using the cars that day- Don't Tell rule applies
- Make a deal with the staff. "If we have $100 \%$ attendance for the Criterion Reference Testing then the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR staff will wash everyone's car on a non-rainy day."
- Make it a point to give one hand written note a day to someone who has done something exceptionally well.
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- Melted crayon hearts- "You color my world because...."
- Mini-fridge for a week in the adults' office area filled with his or her favorite drink
- Name the conference room after an employee each week. Base the choice on someone who has received a lot of gotchas that week. Make a sign for the door and make sure to call people down to the Violet Conference Room.
- Once a month host an ice cream social with a "sister"- "brother" school. Alternate schools each month and let teachers tour getting ideas from each other on lesson plans, bulletin boards, etc. I Spy something great I'd like to duplicate
- Order business cards for each staff member (http://www.vistaprint.com/frf?frf=691384697124 ) Pick a design that fits each person's personality. Vista Print has almost free deals on business cards.
- Order enough flowers for each staff member to get one and stand at the door as each person enters and tell them you appreciate the way they help children "bloom" in this building.
- Organize a lunchtime game that everyone can watch. For example, set up a jeopardy game, who wants to be a millionaire etc. in the staff lounge and challenge two contestants during lunch to play while others watch.
- Pass out grape juice in plastic goblets at the next staff meeting and toast each other. Keep going until everyone has received a toast.
- Permission to leave the building at lunch time for lunch off campus
- Plan a big faculty meeting or inservice at someone's house - with a pool and a grill instead of sitting on the little dot seats in the cafeteria
- Poll your staff to find out what they would like to have training in and then have your UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team decide where some training opportunities exist and who should go to those trainings.
- Post goals in teachers' lounge and graph results. Example: Positive phone contacts home- shoot for 2 times the number of students in the school. Set the goal of $200 \%$ in 6 weeks. (graph phone calls, post cards, emails, notes)
- Postcard sent home detailing something admired in the adult
- Preferred parking space
- Principal and staff member trade jobs for a day
- Principal institutes a pineapple upside down day- Everyone comes in and is assigned a different job for half a day- Everyone has to have their job description or lesson plans written down step by step
- Principal kidnaps a class after PE or recess and take them somewhere else. Send a messenger to the teacher telling him or her to put their feet up for 20 minutes. Teach a lesson to the class on something of interest to you- American History- Art etc.
- Principal leaves love notes on adults' desks - not the 6:00 news kind- the kudos kind
- Principal takes over morning or afternoon duty for an adult in the building
- Principal writes lesson plans for teacher for one period
- PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) (Parent Teacher Organization) designs 5 strokes for every poke lanyard for all adults in the building
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- PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) takes turns baking a casserole once a week for an adult "gotcha" receiver (it's their dinner that night)
- Purchase small plants for each staff member and place on their desk. Leave a note saying, "I know you'll nurture this plant to full beauty because of the way you nurture children."
- Scrape ice off windshield of Staff of the Day's car
- Sneak into the school over the weekend and write a note on each classroom white board telling them to "Have a Great Week"
- Special table outdoors for teachers to enjoy sunshine during lunch
- Stuart Smalley- Glitter Mirrors "You are good enough, you are strong enough and gosh darn it those kids need you."
- Supply a box of birthday cards to each staff member. On birthdays, encourage each staff member to fill out a birthday card and do a drive-by carding by hiding birthday cards all over the person's area throughout the day. For example, the birthday person might find a card taped to the staff restroom mirror, or on the coffee pot and so on.
- Surprise an adult in the building by letting two or three students wash their car- be careful on this one though- There are also services that come on sight and wash cars for a fee- possibly PTO (Parent Teacher Organization) could sponsor
- Surprise staff by greeting them at the door with a cup of hot coffee or diet coke (know what everyone's drink of choice is) Just say, "We are so glad you are here today."
- Surprise the staff with a scavenger hunt all over the school. As each person enters the building have them see a sign that says "Immediately check your box." In their boxes have a candy bar that says, "Your next clue is awaiting you at the coldest water
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fountain in the school." When the staff members get to the coldest water fountain, one of the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team members will be waiting with a bottle of water that has the next clue taped on it. This will go on and end up in the cafeteria where the team meets up again and has a breakfast ready for all the staff members.
- Surprise whole staff and take them on a group outing on a weekend- for example: 1) movie theater to see an uplifting movie, 2) breakfast at a restaurant, 3) BBQ at someone's house or 4) pool party at someone's house (preferably someone with a pool $)$ )
- Survey the staff and find out what their least favorite part of the job is. Throughout the year, have the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR committee do one disliked job for each person. For example, Mrs. Green might dislike bus duty. The UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team might take Mrs. Green's bus duty some Friday and let Mrs. Green go home early.
- Take a survey of the staff on their favorite magazines. Purchase some subscriptions to put out in the staff lounge.
- Take an old real estate sign and paint it with white enamel paint or chalkboard paint. Each day when the staff are pulling into the parking lot let them see the UNIVERSAL PBIS BEHAVIOR team has written a special thank you to one staff member for something outstanding each day. "Mrs. Orange, we love the way you handled the bullying situation yesterday." "Way to Go."
- Think about each employee's strength and ask them to share that strength with others. This could be done through faculty meetings, one to one mentoring, etc. Make sure when the
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employee is asked to share, they are told why they were chosen. "What made them stand out as an exemplar in this area?"
- Treat bags- shovels with "I dig you because.... ."
- Valet parking for a day- put a sign out in the morning inviting a certain staff member to park and wait for valet parking to come out (PBIS team member)
- When a new employee comes to the school (including substitutes), set expectations by planning a small celebration welcoming the new person. Make an intercom announcement welcoming the substitute and ask everyone to make them feel welcome.
- When employees have to work extra (PTO, Parent Teacher Conferences, etc.) provide a catered dinner.


## Notes for your ideas:

## Group vs Group Reinforcement Within the School

Principal chooses classroom with the most gotchas each week and presents trophy on the door:

- Light up Rug from Ikea in front of the classroom door
- Post made from wood that lights up in front of classroom door (woodworker can make from lumber scraps)
- Funny hat that starts out with one feather. Every time the principal chooses a class, he or she adds a feather to the cap. By the end of the year it will be ridiculously feathery
- Knocked the principal's socks off. Pair of toe socks stuffed and encased in a plastic tube as a trophy for the class with the most gotchas
- Smarty Pants- Class with the most gotchas gets a trophy made from a pair of young child's jeans sewn shut at the bottom and stuffed. Pants are covered with Smarties candies as a class trophy. Smarties are glued shut
- Picnic basket trophy- class with the most gotchas gets to eat lunch with the principal - picnic style one day that week


## Notes for your ideas:

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## General School Ideas

- Our expectations for gotchas:
- Must be in triplicate
- Top copy goes home to parents. Parents are taught in training how to respond when comes home
- Brag
- Ask questions about how they completed that behavior
- Help them generalize- what would that look like at:
- Home
- Grocery store
- Museum
- Middle copy gets put in homeroom teacher's box
- This is the one that gets recorded at some schools (classroom teachers record)
- This is the one that is saved for cashing in at the PBIS Store (coupons for things in this booklet)
- Teacher brags about the gotchas and announces who and what they did to the class
- Bottom copy goes to the principal.
- This one is used for recording purposes in some schools
- Principal draws 3-10 names a day and brags on those students with behavior specific praise
- Using your PBIS data, determine which day of the week will be the most difficult. Secretly signal all staff what day the next week they
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will wear their school shirts. When the students come in the next morning and see all staff wearing school shirts, the students know it is double gotcha day.
- Some schools have special gotchas they give that day that are a different color, or the number two in the top corner. Other schools just write on the gotcha (because it's triplicate and the only copy the students get is the top copy).
- This is especially useful for those days before a three-day weekend or a holiday.
- Leave your mark on the school
- Invite Eagle Scouts who need a project to come to your school to make any of the following:
- Buddy benches
- Performing stages on the outdoor playground
- Wardrobe closets for dramatic performances
- Students can cash in gotchas to put their handprint as decoration on the finished product
- One of the topics we brainstormed in our monthly meetings was how to get more gotchas given :
- One of the things we discussed was the need for the following visitors to understand the purpose behind gotchas- this was developed:
- Give them booklets to know which behaviors are worthy of gotchas

- Here are some of the ideas we developed that worked well
- Ask parents to come in and volunteer one day a month
- Invite Watch Dog Dads into your school- great program

- Invite residents from an independent care center to come be surrogate grandparents at the school
- Invite the rotary club to come for an hour a week and catch students being exemplars


## Group Contingencies-Group Reinforcements for Teachers Within the Classroom

We include a few ideas here to spark your interest. The new FY17 Positive Interventions and Effective Strategies book coming in August 2016 will be filled with ideas for classroom teachers.

## Group Contingencies- Group Rewards

The summer before you begin using this technique stop at garage sales in your area. Many of the items you might want for group contingencies can be purchased for a few dollars. If several of you are starting your teaching career together, you might want to meet for breakfast on Saturday morning and then head out to hit the garage sales. Most of the items on this list can be shared between two or three teachers. You will be looking for things that can be used to make good behavior a fun game. Group contingencies: Group rewards is about getting the students working together to earn a group reinforcer.

Use things like:

- Mr. Potato Head

- As you catch the students being good as a whole class, draw one name out of your student pick jar and have that student come up and add a piece to "blank" Mr. Potato Head. Once he is all put together the students get a reinforcer.
- Cootie Bug

- www.tinyurl.com/homeworkopoly
- This is a free download that looks like a Monopoly game
- As you catch the class being good in returning their homework, you move the pieces on the game board and the students earn reinforcers
- Scratch off tickets
- Use this as the reward portion of the group contingencieswhen they have the Potato Head put together or the marble jar lit up etc., they get to scratch off a reinforcer.
- Mix two parts airplane model paint with 1 part dishwashing detergent
- Draw bubble letters on a piece of tag board
- Write a reinforcer inside each letter
- Laminate the bubble letters
- Paint over the letters
- Let dry- will take more than one night for it to
 dry
- Students can scratch off
- Barrel of Monkeys
- Purchase any color of barrel of monkeys, they are available for less than $\$ 10$ at toy discount stores
- Put a self-stick hook on the white board up near the top
- Put one of the monkeys hanging up on the hook
- As you catch the students being good, add a monkey
- When the monkeys reach the silver tray, the whole class wins a reinforcer

- Links on a chain
- Dollar stores have giant links for babies. They are very colorful and link together
- Do the same thing as the Barrel of Monkeys, but with links
- During months that are more difficult for behavior, use smaller links and that way you can catch more kids being good
- Plastic Sink Strainer- Ribbons- Weaving good behavior in the classroom
- Purchase a plastic sink strainer at a dollar store
- Gather left over ribbons and attach them to the top of the sink strainer
- As students are caught being good,
 draw one student's name to come "weave a row for good behavior"
- When the whole strainer is woven, the class earns a reinforcer

- Brownie Points
- Aluminum cookie sheet
- Brownies run off from "pictures on Microsoft Office".
- Make the appropriate size so that 12 of them will fit on the cookie sheet
- Laminate the brownies and put a magnet on the back.
- Marble Run- Made from a Pool Noodle
- Purchase a pool noodle from the dollar store
- Cut it in half hot dog way (the long way)
- Attach it to the silver tray under the white board
- Put each end into a clear Tupperware square and label one " $A$ " and one " $B$ "
- Get two big shooter marbles and set them on the silver tray
- You'll choose two students from your name cup and give each a marble.
- Whichever one lands first is the winning reinforcer.
- Mystery Motivator
- Like hangman- students flip over

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 letters to find out what the reward they earned

- Marbles in a jar- light it up
- Purchase marbles, clear flat rocks, or jelly beans they have at the dollar store and a clear glass mason jar.
- As you catch the kids being good, you will add marbles
- I used this type of system:

- 3 marbles if another teacher complimented my students
- 5 marbles if the principal complimented my students
- 2 marbles if I complimented the whole class
- 1 marble if I complimented one student- they earned it for the whole class
- Right before the last marble is about to be entered to the jar, take all the marbles out while the kids are gone. Sneak in a strand of Christmas lights and hide the cord on the back side of a book shelf.
- Plug the lights into a power strip with a switch turned "OFF"
- When the last marble goes in, move your foot to the switch and light up the jar. The kids' eyes will pop out of their head and they will want to do it again.
- Piggy bank jar of good choices
- Purchase a small piggy bank and use pennies
- When the piggy bank is full, the students earn the reinforcement
- Pot holder loops
- Put tons of pot holder loops in your pockets
- As you catch individual students being good, hand them a pot holder loop to wear as a bracelet
- Give behavior specific praise as you hand the student a loop
- At the end of the day walk around the room with a container and collect all the pot holder loops and count them as you pick the loops up.
- Have a set number in mind that you have shared with the students and if they reach that number, they earn the number of pot holder loops they earn the class reinforcer
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- Smarty Pants

- I purchased a Smarty Pant game online at Ebay for several dollars. I use the plastic pants as a holder.
- When students get caught being good, they get to add their name to the Smarty Pants
- I can draw a name from the pants for any number of reinforcers including being able to spin the reinforcer wheel, or drop a marble down the marble run
- A real reinforcer the students like is the ability to sit in the teacher's chair

## Group vs. Group Contingency and Reinforcement

## Classroom Management

Here's one idea. There are many out there. This is pitting one group against the whole group. Each day is a new chance, so it is not a bad rivalry and works with elementary and secondary.

Each grouping of desks is divided into teams in this example. Each grouping is color coded based on their chair color and coaster for their water bottles. As each table grouping is caught exhibiting excellent behavior (remember to raise their hands, keeping their area neat, staying in area, staying on topic, etc.) they earn a color coordinating clothespin on a color coordinated bar hanging in the front of the room.

(I left these pictures in color for the electronic version- as you can see the rods on the board are coordinating colors to the group colors in the room. Clothespins were spray painted to match the color coding)

Whichever group earns the most clothespins the day before, gets to sit in the special seating area of the classroom for Daily Five.

Similar reinforcements can be earned through points, paperclips in team cups, etc. The reinforcer should be something a different group could earn each day.

## Notes for your ideas:

## Individual Contingency-Individual Reinforcement

Here is a sample that worked for us at the secondary level. We hated students flying in the door just as the bell rang. We numbered all the chairs in the room. The minute the bell was about to ring, we would draw a number stick and whomever was seated in that chair, earned the teachers chair for the hour. If the tushie was not in the chair at the moment of the bell ringing, so sad- the chair went to the next number drawn. This was very effective after the first few days of learning.

Anything that is a problem for you- make it a reinforcer for the replacement behavior. It is quite the incentive to learn the new replacement behavior.

## Notes for your ideas:

The following pages are ideas for your own use-feel free to download the electronic version and spiff these up for your school. We have found having a rolling cart with drawers and coupons already preprinted shortens the length of time students spend in the PBIS Gotcha Store. Also, posting the coupons in a front window for perusing helps students know what they want before they come inside the store.

One principal has a staff member stand outside the store room and that person ensures they have their gotchas stapled in groups of ten and the student is ready to make their purchase. This principal has a poster outside the door with that week's menu selection.

Some principals have a spinning prize wheel and for 10 gotchas the students can spin the prize wheel. They will earn a coupon for whatever the wheel lands on. Some students like to take this chance and others are more frugal with their choices.

Secondary students can run the store with adult supervision before and after school. This alleviates any issues of being late to class. Another idea used by some secondary schools is opening the store only during lunch time. The students are allowed to cash in gotchas during their lunch period. Student volunteers usually run the store (student council).

Have fun, and remember: We are doing this to encourage appropriate behavior. We are not bribing students to be good. We are all fed by reinforcement. Whether it is negative or positive reinforcement, it motivates our behavior. If we focus on the negative and what not to do, the energy will gravitate toward the negative. If we are having fun and focusing on the positive, the energy of the school will gravitate toward positive behavior.

## Have fun!

## Our last idea to share is this:

Ask your PTO/PTA to purchase a plastic frame and plastic insert for each classroom door. Put bright construction paper behind it and a heading like "Positive thought for the day". These are available for $\$ 1$ at the Dollar Stores. You may have to go to more than one to get enough. Make sure it is all plastic. Industrial Velcro them on the doors or outside the doors. With a Vis a’ Vis pen, write a positive message each day. Let the teachers choose their own positive message, but give them reinforcers for changing them every day. You can google quotes. You can choose a student each day to write the message for the next day. The school will be filled with positive vibe.
